

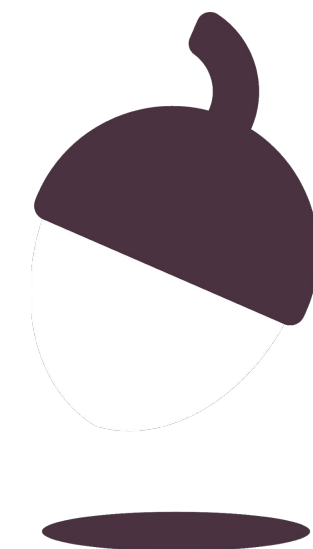

Present tense

-er and ir verbs:

To talk about '**we**' with an action **we do now**,
remove -er/ir from the infinitive and add **these endings**:

Comer → Com**emos**

Subir → Sub**imos**

To talk about '**they**' with an action **they do now**,
remove -er/ir from the infinitive and add **these endings**:

Comer → Com**en**

Subir → Sub**en**



Preterite tense

-er and ir verbs:



To talk about '**we**' with an action completed in the past remove -er/ir from the infinitive and add **these endings:**

Comer → Com**imos**

Subir → Sub**imos**

What do you notice about the endings?

To talk about '**they**' with an action completed in the past, remove -er/ir from the infinitive and add **these endings:**

Comer → Com**ieron**

Subir → Sub**ieron**



Summary

1. The two verb endings we have looked at today are ‘ er/ir ’
2. We use ‘-emos’ for the we form of the verb in the present tense.
3. ‘Comimos’ means ‘we ate’
