
The Western Front was a major **theatre of war** during the First World War.

It was in northern France and southern Belgium.

Some of the key battles were fought around Verdun, The Somme and Vimy Ridge




Timeline of the twentieth century

You will get lots of images of men in trenches on the Western Front.

Our image of the First World War often comes from poems by Wilfred Owen or films such as 1917.

We think of barbed wire, British men suffering in trenches and big guns.

All of those things happened during the First World War.

But recently there has been more of a focus on 'often forgotten armies'.



Looking again at the First World War

While most of the fighting took place in Europe, battles happened across the world.

Most of the 70 million men who took part in the war were white Europeans, but 4 million weren't.

This enquiry looks at their stories and asks what can we learn about the Western Front by looking at their experiences?
