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

Rhythm Grid - Performing from notation

4. Which lines will make up your main groove?
 - Will you repeat any lines?
 - Which order will you play them in?
 - Will you play lines from left to right or right to left?
 - Will you play lines vertically?
6. Can you add an improvised section?
7. Can a family member play a different line at the same time as you to create a polyrhythmic texture?
8. If you play an instrument, you could add pitches to your rhythmic notation.
9. If you can already read notation, make each box a bar in 4/4 instead of a beat.
